Former San Diego Bay Guest Has Tragic Collision With Brooklyn Bridge.

On May 17th the Mexican Navy training ship Cuauhtémoc crashed into the Brooklyn Bridge, resulting in two deaths and at least 19 injuries. The incident occurred when the ship lost steerage while maneuvering away from Pier 17 a short distance away from the Brooklyn Bridge, causing its masts to collide with the bridge.

The entire incident unfolded in about five minutes and stands as a grim reminder of the inherent risks Continued on Page 2, Column 1.

Convair deployed three teams to the most recent Duck Derby, a pursuit style fun race held every Friday night on San Diego Bay.

The race is sponsored by Doyle Sails. Participation is free and the rules are simple. Slower boats start earlier. Later start times are given to faster boats. The course is laid out in the north bay between

The tragedy was made worse because sailor were manning the yards (see photo above) when all three masts struck the bridge.

Ensign Race Takes Place Under Cloudy Skies And Brisk Winds



E453, under cloudy skies and choppy waters, makes the final dash to the finish line in the May 17th race. The race took less than 1 hour, 40 min. Heeling of 20 to 25° was common. This is the only surviving photo of the race.

The Ensign captains chose Course B which runs along Shelter Island due to winds that were coming from the south. This made for great spinnaker sailing as they proceeded north towards Harbor Island.

and for most of the upwind it was difficult to predict the strategy of your competitors.

The downwind was a different story with each boat seemingly choosing the same exact path from G17 to R20. Even the E1122 resisted the temptation to tour the edge of North Island.

The winds had shifted for the second upwind run. Three of the Ensigns were tracking their race on RaceQs. Unfortunately, this data was only available for the E1122 and the E2. During the first upwind, both boats covered the distance while tacking only 4 times. During the second upwind the E1122 tacked 11 times. The E2 tacked 7 times - although one of them was to avoid colliding with the E453 (Jeff Nelson was skippering the E2, what did you expect?).

The final leg of the race saw a duel between the E192 and E1122. Both skippers had to draw on their extensive sailing experience (and, apparently, their equally extensive knowledge of the rulebook).

The E1122 prevailed, giving them their third 'First Place' finish this season. 🔁



New Marina Slip Configuration, Effective Immediately

As noted in the March issue of WindWords (Pg. 1, Column 1), our club fleet has been resized from 16 to 12 boats. The club now has six Ensigns and six Victories. This change will save the club considerable money going forward. The rental on the slip alone was over \$2,000 per month. On top of that, we will save on sail replacement and boat maintenance.

The yacht itself is too large to fit into any of the local slips so it was just anchored in the bay in front of the Star of India.





Navigation covers the U.S. Aids to Navigation System; types of buoys and beacons; navigation rules (sometimes referred to as right-of-way rules); avoiding collisions; sound signals; Chart Plotting and Electronic Navigation (GPS)

Passing the test will qualify you for the California Boaters Card required for all CA Boaters!
